The ACP International Field Study Was Implemented



In an effort to enhance the mutual understanding of students from different countries and areas regarding safety management, the ACP International Field Study, "The Japanese Safety Management and Japanese Culture," was held at KUIS from February 21 to February 28, 2020. Participants in this program included 18 students from 5 consortium-member universities from 3 Southeast Asian countries and 6 students from KUIS.

The program contained many activities – apart from lectures at KUIS campus and fieldworks at various facilities in and around Kobe, the students also went one day trip to Kyoto to learn about Japanese traditional culture and furthermore they experienced staying with Japanese families. On the final day, the students made a presentation on what they had learned from the program.

In response to the occurrence of novel coronavirus infections, the program content was partially revised. The sending and hosting universities cooperated to ensure that all the latest recommended virus precautions were taken. For example, the participating students were made to wear masks and to diligently wash their hands with alcohol disinfectant. Thankfully, all the students were able to complete the program without incident and in good health.

This program was led by Prof. Hiroshi Sato of the KUIS School of

Human Sciences and Dr. Manpei Hayashi of the KUIS School of Management. Professor Sato was in charge of Japanese students, while Dr. Hayashi delivered lectures on campus. Dr. Hayashi's research interests and activities include economic reconstruction after major disaster, the formation of cities, the correlation of public security with social factors, and analysis of real estate prices.

#### Field Researches

At the Hyogo Disaster Management Center, students were given an overview of the measures currently taken by the regional government to counter the threat of a Nankai megathrust earthquake (a quake along the fault under the Nankai Trough). Then, after studying an exhibition on the Great Hanshin-Awaji Earthquake and observing scenes of the tsunami damage caused by the Great East Japan Earthquake at the Disaster Reduction and Human Renovation Institution, the students visited the Hyogo Earthquake Memorial 21st Century Research Institute to learn about the current state of disaster research.

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Mr. Masamichi Yoshitsubaki, Secretary General of CODE (Citizens towards Overseas Disaster Emergency), a Kobe-based international NGO dedicated to disaster recovery support, led a workshop for the students. He explained the concept of supporting disaster recovery from a citizen's perspective, and talked about initiatives to educate future generations, financed by the CODE Future Fund.

The students also spent a half-day walking around Sannomiya and Shin-Nagata to visit some earthquake-affected sites to understand the challenges and current state of disaster recovery efforts.

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#### **Final presentations**

On the final day of the program, students were divided into groups by university to make presentations about what they learned during the program. In the morning, students who had prepared late into the previous night looked nervous. In addition to Prof. Sato and Dr. Hayashi, Prof. Murata (Director of the Safety Management Education and Research Center at KUIS), Prof. Kawawaki (Director of Global Education Center at KUIS), and Associate Prof. Ito (Department of International Communication), were also present for the presentation session. A rubric-based assessment of each presentation was performed. On the basis of the rigorous reviews, the Best Presentation Prize was won by the University of Lampung group.

After the Best Presentation Prize was awarded, Prof. Kawawaki, the Director of the Global Education Center, gave each student a certificate of program completion. Each student also received a commemorative gift from Dr. Hayashi.
